About Your Organization

1. Organization Overview*

Please provide a brief background about your organization, including a short summary of the organization's history, mission, goals, accomplishments, and challenges.

Girls on the Run's mission is to inspire girls to be joyful, healthy and confident using a fun, experience-based curriculum, which creatively integrates running. We offer an 8-week program each spring and each fall to girls, grades 3-8, that incorporates lessons on confidence building and intentional decision making with physical fitness. Our program is accessible and inclusive to every girl who wants to participate. We adapt our curriculum to meet the needs of all physical and cognitive abilities. We provide financial assistance to our program. Girls on the Run Chippewa Valley began in 2006. 2026 is our 20th anniversary season. Since inception, over 3,500 girls have participated in our program across western Wisconsin. We serve communities in Dunn County including River Heights Elementary in Menomonie, Colfax Elementary, and Moundview Elementary in Elk Mound. Each season we seek to serve more communities. For our 2027 season, we anticipate over 500 girls will take part in our programming. Funding for our program currently presents the biggest challenge we face. Our long-term financial goal is to maintain a balanced funding model comprised of approximately 50% earned income, primarily from program fees, and 50% fundraising, which includes sponsorships, grants, and individual giving. Current economic conditions have made this balance more difficult to achieve, as sponsorships and grant funding are increasingly competitive. To sustain our program under the current economic conditions, we are focused on increasing enrollment to shift a greater share of our budget from fundraising to program-generated revenue. This strategy is proving successful: enrollment has grown by an average of 24% annually over the past three years and is projected to increase an additional 13% for the 2026 and 2027 seasons. Our aim is to reach 500 plus girls in each of the next two seasons, and this level of participation will exceed our pre-pandemic peak enrollment of 431 girls in 2019.

2. Current Initiatives*

Girls on the Run provides the following major program activities:

1. Spring and Fall Programs: The 8-week spring and 8-week fall programs provide safe and high-quality programming to girls that includes relevant lessons and exercises focusing on confidence building, intentional decision making, expressing joy and optimism, leading with an open heart, and standing up for themselves and others. In addition to these life lessons and a focus on physical fitness, a critical component of the program is the completion of a Community Impact Project (CIP). Executed near the end of the season, 2 full 1.5-hour sessions out of our 16-session season are devoted to ensuring that all participants in Girls on the Run, both girls and coaches, experience the joy and gratification of serving their community. The CIP provides an opportunity for small teams of 8 to 15 girls to use the skills of intentional decision making, embracing differences and finding connectedness, expressing gratitude, assuming positive intent, and standing up for themselves and others, and apply those skills while leading the project. Past CIP's have included writing thank you notes to first responders during Covid lockdown, Sherman Creek Park cleanup, baking treats for a rural branch of Mayo Clinic medical staff with homemade thank you cards, and creating care packages for a local homeless shelter. After each team is finished with their project, they gather to reflect on their efforts and how it felt to complete a Community Impact Project. Each team is challenged to consider that small acts of kindness can make a difference in their community.
2. Celebratory 5K: Each season ends with a non-competitive 5K, held in western Wisconsin, that gives a tangible sense of accomplishment as participants of all abilities cross the finish line at their own pace. Attendance at the spring 2026 5K numbered 1,500+ people and included the girls in the program and their coaches, community runners, volunteers, and friends and family cheering the participants on. Our 5K is a wonderful way for the community to gather and support the accomplishment of the girls, as well as participate in the 5K. We anticipate a growth of 1,800 attendees for our 2027 5K.
3. Camp GOTR: Camp GOTR provides an opportunity for girls of all abilities to develop self-confidence and learn life skills in a fun, collaborative camp environment. Girls build friendships through interactive games, enjoy physical activities, and express creativity through arts and crafts and storytelling. Led by caring and qualified Girls on the Run coaches, Camp GOTR combines the best of the Girls on the Run program with all the fun of camp. Two 1-week summer camps are held annually in June and July in western Wisconsin.

3. Organizational Structure*

Girls on the Run is staffed by one full-time employee, the Executive Director, who manages and delivers the administrative side of the Girls on the Run program. The Executive Director is responsible for the overall implementation of the Girls on the Run mission and reports to the Girls on the Run Board of Directors. The Executive Director's job responsibilities include development and implementation of the overall strategy and vision for the program, as well as all organizational and operational aspects of the programming, including volunteer management, revenue generation, and strategic planning. A 9-member volunteer Board of Directors, consisting of members from our community, assists the Executive Director on a strategic level and is responsible for maintaining financial and operational sustainability.

Volunteers are key to delivering our programming. In 2026, this included 108 coaches for the spring program and summer camps, and over 150 volunteers for our 5K. In 2027 we anticipate needing 120 volunteer coaches to serve as mentors to our participants and over 150 5K volunteers.

About the Grant

What is the community need that this request addresses?

Findings from the 2019 Dunn County Community Health Needs Survey indicate that 8 in 10 Dunn County residents believe there is insufficient access to mental health resources. Nearly two-thirds of the approximately 1,000 residents surveyed said that they or someone close to them experienced negative impacts related to mental health challenges. Girls on the Run addresses these needs by offering a curriculum and programming centered around confidence, reinforced through lessons and exercises. Our trained volunteer coaches lead girls through an 8-week season of practices that teaches girls healthy habits and social-emotional skills. Our program is designed to empower girls to take control of their physical, emotional and social health, and teaches them lasting life skills to lead healthy lives. The curriculum explores what it means to be bold by recognizing the power of positive self-talk, understanding and practicing assertive communication, and confidently practicing what it takes to make a difference in their community. Girls on the Run addresses needs by offering a curriculum and programming centered around confidence. Our trained volunteer coaches teach girls healthy habits and social-emotional skills. Our program is designed to empower girls to take control of their physical, emotional and social health, and teaches them lasting life skills to lead healthy lives.

Project Goals and Activities*

There are two specific goals and activities of our project:

1. Provide the 8-week spring program, open to girls grades 3-5, across western Wisconsin. This program is organized and delivered by our Executive Director, under the direction of the 9-member volunteer Girls on the Run Chippewa Valley Board of Directors. The program is accomplished through recruitment and training of over 100 volunteer coaches from our community, many of whom are teachers in our schools who return year after year to serve as a coach.
2. Provide an impactful, community wide, end of season 5K. The 5K is held in western Wisconsin each May, is a community event, and provides a tangible sense of accomplishment for the girls in our program. Anticipated attendance of 1,500+ people for our 2027 5K will include the girls in the program and their coaches, community runners, volunteers, and friends and family cheering their runners on. It's a celebration that has become a significant community event. Putting on an event of this size is no easy task and our chapter depends on the generosity and dedication of volunteers in our community. After race snacks and refreshments are donated by area businesses. Our 5K was voted as one of the top 3 in the VolumeOne Best Run/Walk category for 2025, an indication of the success of our event and the impact it has on the community.

Girls on the Run utilizes the following measures to assist with evaluating program success:

1. Surveys are sent to parents/caregivers of participants and coaches at the conclusion of the program to provide feedback. Girls on the Run International analyzes and consolidates this information and provides us with an extensive, detailed report based on survey responses, which includes topics such as program impact on physical activity and confidence, satisfaction with the program, and testimonials. The Executive Director and Board of Directors reviews the survey results and strategizes on methods to implement suggestions for continuous improvement of the program.
2. Program enrollment is tracked each season with success determined by continued growth in program participation year over year. Although the number of girls participating is a very basic measure, it is quantifiable and a very strong indication that parents, girls, coaches, and schools see value in the program, are having a positive experience, and are sharing that with others in the community.

Project Outcomes*

Describe the anticipated outcomes resulting from this grant project, its impact and how the community will be better served.

The following outcomes are anticipated as a result of our grant request to support the Girls on the Run curriculum and program materials, along with service and impact to the community, and the measures we will use to evaluate

program success:

1. Deliver a program for girls, grades 3-5, that results in social-emotional learning, mental health well-being, and increased confidence in their physical fitness and ability. The community is better served by having a program that contributes to forming healthy, productive adults. To assist with measuring the success of achieving this outcome, surveys are sent to parents/caregivers of participants and coaches at the conclusion of the program to provide feedback. The Executive Director and Board of Directors review the survey results and strategize on methods to implement suggestions for continuous improvement of the program. In addition, program enrollment is tracked each season with success determined by continued growth in program participation year over year. It is a quantifiable measure that provides a very strong indication that parents, girls, coaches, and schools see value in the program, are having a positive experience, and are sharing it with others in the community.
2. Completion of Community Impact Projects (CIP) by Girls on the Run teams. The CIP plays an important role in not only building girls' connectedness with one another, but also with their wider community. The community is better served by such things as park clean up, thank you notes to other community volunteers, care packages for local homeless shelters, and treats and thank you notes to local medical staff. Success is determined by completion of these meaningful projects each season.
3. Provide a successful, community wide celebratory 5K. A successful 5K results in connecting the girls to our community, and giving them a tangible result of their hard work and dedication to a goal. For many girls, it is the first time they have attempted a feat like this. The community is better served by having an inspiring event that they can choose to participate in by cheering on the girls, being a volunteer, or running the 5K. It's an annual event the community has come to look forward to and depend on. The event fosters a sense of belonging and provides an opportunity to meet other families, neighbors, educators, community leaders, and open-hearted, like-minded individuals who also share a commitment to empowering local youth. Success will be measured by increased participation rates year over year and continued support by area businesses for this event.

Positive outcomes include providing a safe, high-quality program to girls and maintaining full program inclusivity, accessibility and integrity by providing quality materials and curriculum to every participant and volunteer in the area who wants to be involved with Girls on the Run, while also maintaining sustainability of full GOTR-Chippewa Valley operations. GOTR strives to directly improve the lives of girls and women in our community by building self-esteem, developing healthy lifestyles, and fostering constructive relationships. Girls join the program at a critical time in their lives (grades 3-8) when they will be challenged physically, mentally and emotionally. GOTR gives girls an enduring and transformative sense of empowerment, strength and confidence that they will take with them for a lifetime.

Sustainability*

Girls on the Run continues to build back after the pandemic. We seek to have a balance of funding for our program based on approximately 50% from earned income, which is generated primarily from programming fees, and 50% from fundraising, which includes sponsorships, grants, and individual giving. Current economic conditions make this desired state challenging, with sponsorships and grants becoming more difficult to secure. In order to sustain our program beyond this grant, we will look to continue to increase our enrollment to shift a greater percentage of funding of our budget from fundraising to programming revenue. We are seeing success with this approach. Enrollment has increased an average of 24% per year over the past three years, and will increase by another 13% with our anticipated enrollment of 460 girls for the 2026 and 2027

seasons. Enrollment of 460 girls will surpass our high-water enrollment mark prior to the pandemic of 431 girls in 2019. In addition, we strive to keep our costs under control by ongoing due diligence at the board level by monitoring our budget, overhead expenses, and overall program spending strategy. We also continue to identify new opportunities for sponsorships and grants across the communities we serve.

Our grant request will fund curriculum books and participation kits for our 2027 programming, which includes an 8-week spring and fall program and 2 summer camps.

Portion requested in this grant:

\$3,515: Curriculum books and participation kits. Our curriculum and participation kits are critical to teaching girls to be responsible citizens, to have fun and express their emotions, to lead with an open heart and to stand up for themselves and others.

- \$2,015: \$3.25 per participation kit x 620 (500 girls + 120 coaches= 620)
- \$1,500: \$30 per curriculum book x 50 books required for 500 girls participating in the program

Other expenses:

\$3,500: Program materials. We provide each team the materials that they need to have a successful and safe season or camp. Program materials include items such as art and craft supplies, first aid kits, and running and agility materials.

- \$7 per girl for program materials x 500 girls

Our grant request will fund curriculum books and participation kits for our 2027 programming, which includes an 8-week spring and fall program and 2 summer camps. Girls on the Run educates girls of all cognitive and physical abilities in grades 3-8 to recognize their individual strengths, while connecting as a community. Girls on the Run not only focuses on the importance of physical activity for living a healthy life, but also on mental health outcomes through physical fitness. The Girls on the Run curriculum focuses on self-confidence, community impact, and how to stand up for yourself and others. Our evidence based lessons in our curricula equip girls to:

- Build the confidence to be themselves and love who they are
 - o Shine in their own way
 - o Encourage others to embrace who they are
 - o Develop life skills such as understanding and embracing emotions, handling peer pressure, and celebrating each other's differences
- Build the confidence to do hard things
 - o Take on challenges and believe in themselves
 - o Strengthen their resilience with stick-with-it strategies
 - o Develop life skills like managing big emotions, learning from mistakes, and approaching challenges with a growth mindset
- Build the confidence to boldly share what's in their hearts
 - o Use their voices even when they feel uncertain
 - o Help others to share their thoughts, ideas, and feelings
 - o Develop life skills like clear communication, listening to understand, and resolving conflicts with others

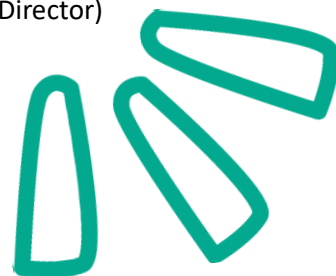
